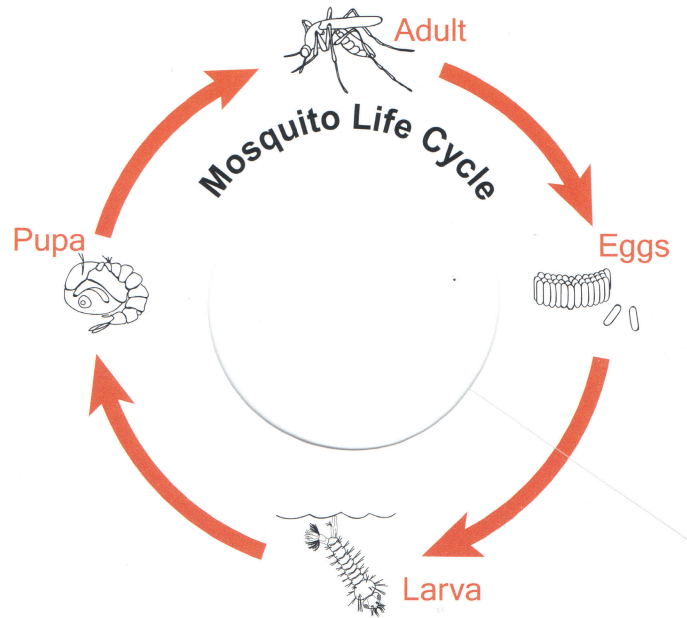

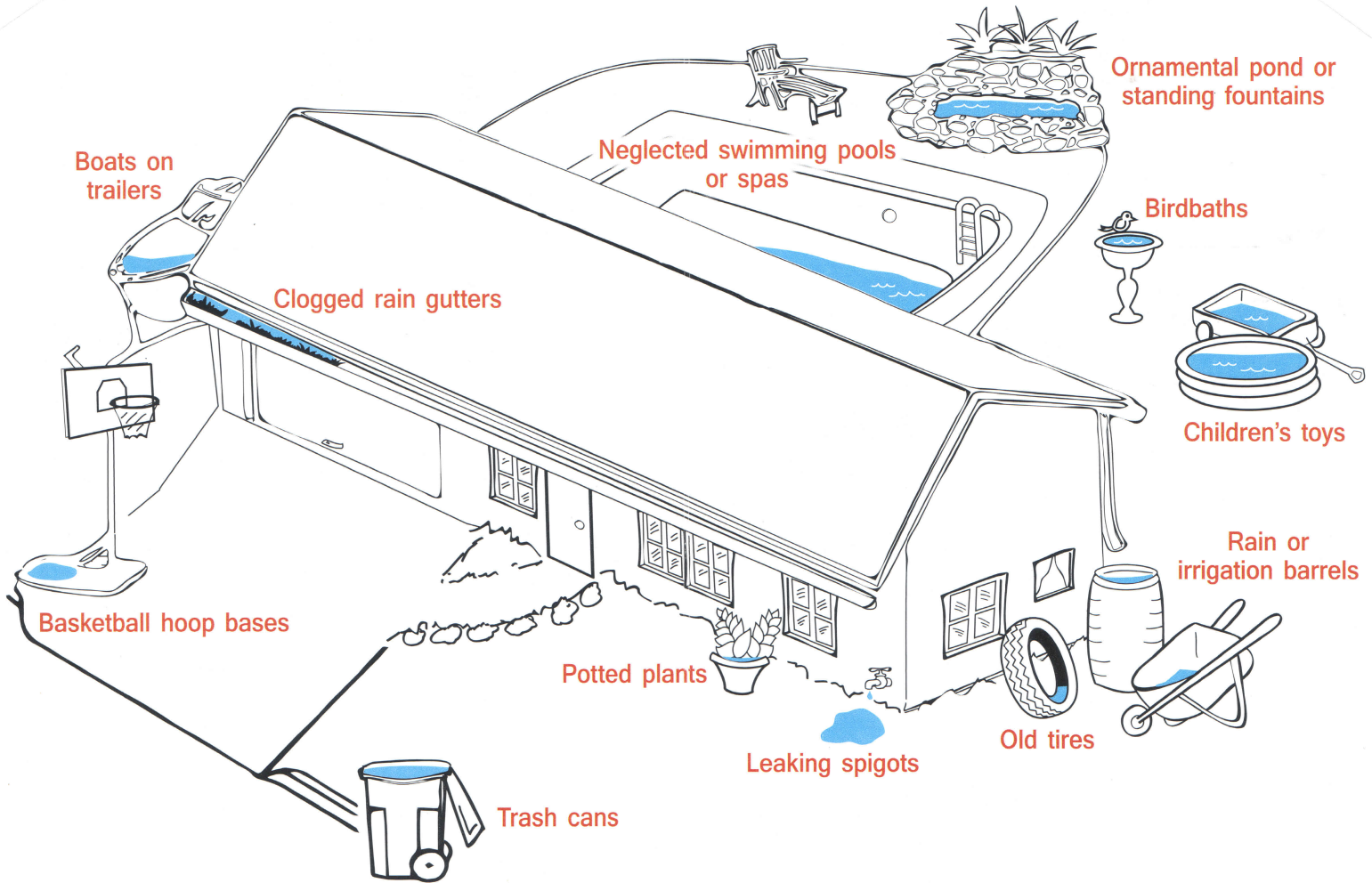
Protect AGAINST Mosquito-borne ILLNESS

This door hanger is to let you know that your area has been inspected for mosquitoes. Please see the inside diagram and back page for more information about what was found and what was done to help eliminate mosquitoes in your area. Below are potential viruses that mosquitoes could transmit:

DENGUE FEVER – Caused by the dengue virus and transmitted to humans by the bite of an infected mosquito. Symptoms include fever, headache, muscle and joint pain and a skin rash similar to measles. A more severe form of the dengue infection is dengue hemorrhagic fever, an affliction that can be fatal if not managed properly.

CHIKUNGUNYA – Virus which is transmitted to people by infected mosquitoes. The most common symptoms of chikungunya virus infection are fever and joint pain. Other symptoms may include headache, muscle pain, joint swelling or rash. Symptoms usually begin three to seven days after being bitten.

WEST NILE VIRUS – An arthropod-borne virus (arbovirus) most commonly spread by infected mosquitoes. About one in five infected people will develop a fever with body aches, joint pains, vomiting, diarrhea or rash. Less than one percent of infected people develop a serious neurological illness such as encephalitis or meningitis.



REDUCE YOUR RISK: ELIMINATE BREEDING AREAS

Mosquitoes breed in standing water. You can add to our efforts to prevent the spread of mosquito-borne illness by maintaining items in your yard that collect water.
